

	How to support your child in Year 7,8 and 9 Modern Foreign Languages
General	There is no expectation that you have any knowledge of the language your child is learning but rather that you are able to help them. When supporting your child with their home learning, please refer to the notes that they will have made in lesson in their yellow exercise books, blue vocab books and white printed vocab lists. It is essential that they get used to using these reference tools to complete independent learning. The yellow exercise book also contains a sheet of key vocab, including time phrases, question words, connectives, opinion phrases, negatives and intensifiers. Please avoid using Google Translate or other translation websites as these may translate literally rather than accurately.
Vocabulary	Homework will include fortnightly vocabulary tests. The class teacher will tell classes how many words to learn (usually between 10 – 15). The test is usually English to target language. Pupils are given a vocabulary list on paper at the start of term. They should keep this safe and bring it to lessons. The list can be accessed in the relevant language and year section of Sharepoint https://alsager.sharepoint.com/Sites/Learning/SitePages/Home.aspx The vocabulary is also on Quizlet, which is a language learning platform, it can be accessed here: www.quizlet.com Pupils should create a Quizlet account and write their username and password in their organiser. Suggested ways of learning vocab are: Look, say, cover, write, check. Create flashcards with the Target Language on one side and English on the other. Test your child by saying the English and they write or spell the Target Language word. Stick tricky words around the house in obvious places so you see them repeatedly. Create a mnemonic e.g. Big Elephants Always Undertake Challenges On Unusual Platforms (Beaucoup) Little and often is better for vocabulary learning. Pupils should also revisit previous vocabulary regularly to build a firm foundation for learning.
