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16 to 19 Bursary Fund

- The Sixth Form bursary is designed to support students in meeting their costs of study.
- Eligible students can receive between £100 and £1200 per year depending on the criteria for eligibility they meet (based on government guideline).
- In the past year students have utilised the 16 to 19 bursary fund to support the payment of:
 - Transport costs.
 - Purchasing additional subject resources such as revision guides and online tuition.
 - Obtaining equipment to meet specific needs, such as reading pens.
 - Supporting costs related to trips and visits.

Transport














A week as a sixth former consists of...

25 minute sessions with different foci across the week






Study periods

- Independent study periods
- Non-independent study periods
- Flexible study periods





- Research shows that students who fulfil their potential at sixth form complete an additional 20 hours of studying towards their subjects per week - homework alone will not fulfil this.
- Independent learning allows learning to be personalised so that students spend additional time on the areas they require most help on.
- Independent learning tasks provide you with examples of 'Supra-Curricular' experiences students need to populate your personal statement for university as well as supporting statements for apprenticeships and jobs.



- Revision (cue cards, mind maps etc)
- Past paper questions
- Reattempting/redrafting
- Reading ahead (prereading)
- Completing wider academic reading / listening / viewing and producing a VIPER summary
- Watching an online tutorial/revision video and making summary notes.
- Completing a MOOC (Massive Online Open Course)

Enrichment

- Other activities students can participate in beyond their lessons.
- In Year 12 you will have a number of opportunities to broaden your sixth form experience, including:
 - Wednesday afternoon Sports and Societies (SportSocs)
 - Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award
 - Student leadership opportunities
 - Volunteering, mentoring and tuition


